1.6. Preferential Procurement

This bid and during the time of Request for Quotation the Preferential Procurement Policy Framework Act and the Preferential Procurement Regulations, 2022 as applicable to Provincial Government Business Enterprises as listed under Schedule 3(D) of the Public Finance Management Act and the ECDC Procurement Policy as amended from time to time will apply.

All submitted Quotations will be evaluated in the following 2 stages:

Stage 1	Involves an evaluation of Functionality only: At this stage Service Provider/Bidders must score a minimum percentage of 70% for functionality to be shortlisted for further evaluation on price and preference points.

1.2. Background

The Eastern Cape Development Corporation, in line with its mandate of coordinating economic development, trade and investment in the province is supporting activities aimed at ensuring inclusive agro industry development in the province. The support is provided in the form of facilitating development, providing development finance and enterprise support in line with the priority sectors as per the Provincial Economic Development Strategy, of which agro industry is but one of the sectors. In implementing programmes aimed at developing the sector, the ECDC collaborates with other sector stakeholders and as such entered collaborations with the Eastern Cape Rural Development Agency (ECRDA).

In the 2013/14 financial year, the ECRDA and ECDC applied and received an amount of R91 million grant funding for the establishment of Mqanduli and Ncora Rural Economic Development (RED) Hubs from the Jobs Fund and each entity contributed a further R5 million rands each as part of the programme. The grant fund was meant for infrastructure development and crop production with a target of 1000 ha per RED hub. In the 2014/15 financial year, Eastern Cape Treasury took a decision to establish two more Rural Enterprise Development (RED) Hubs both at Lady frere and Mbizana focusing on grain value-chain in the communities which were mainly led by the ECRDA. The rationale for establishment of the RED hubs, was mainly to address underdevelopment in the rural areas and discourage the migration of the people from rural areas to affluent cities with the purpose of securing jobs and advancing their economic status. This was evident from the migratory trends where most of the people were leaving the coastal belt and central regions of the province to the Western region of the province. Considering the agricultural production potential and activities in the Eastern region of the province, the exodus triggered the need for the development of proper long-term planning especially in terms of infrastructure development and spatial planning to cater for such future growth and agricultural expansion. The development of economic infrastructure in the form of RED hubs was viewed as intervention for the creation of new economic opportunities in the local communities through value addition of primary agriculture products from the communities and provide platforms for aggregation and distribution, thus stimulating local economy. It was also anticipated that new private sector players would notice the platforms and invest as part of bringing their services to communities and in turn create jobs and improve livelihoods in the areas. In essence, the RED hubs were to provide platforms for rural industrialisation and hence were expected to stimulate the local economy and improve investments in the areas. The concept of RED Hubs has been anchored on linking the three market elements of production, processing and marketing in order to

boost competitiveness for the targeted communities and build the local value-chain thus strengthening the rural economy.

The graphic representation of the model has been as per the figure below:

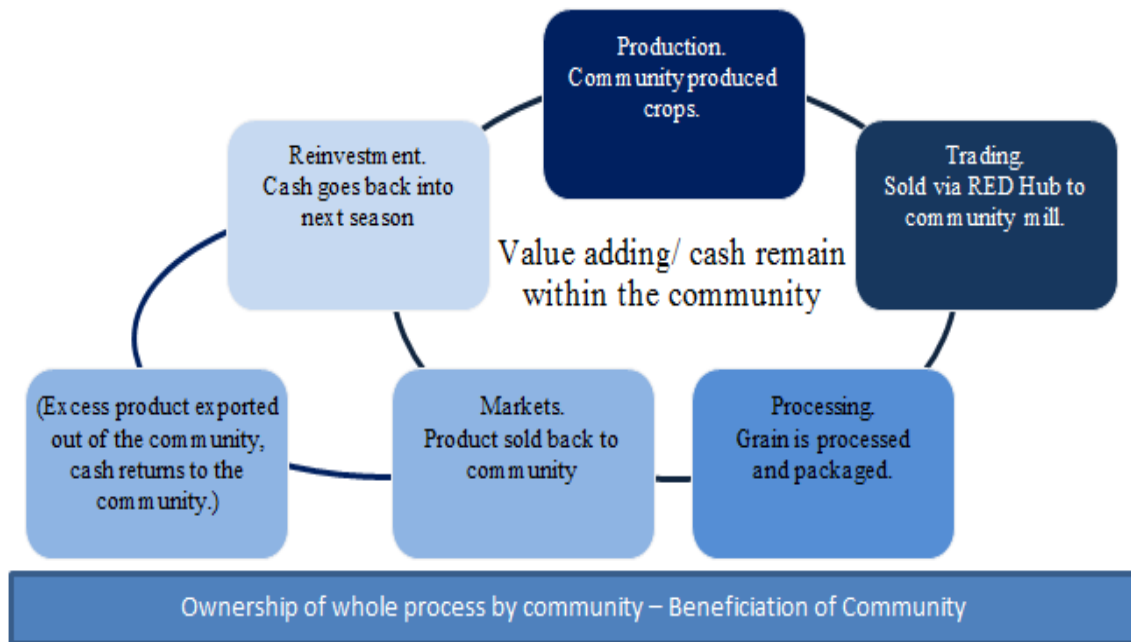


Figure 1. RED Hub operating cycle.

Despite all the good intentions, there has been challenges with the RED Hubs programme which range from security of markets, inconsistent supply of the desired primary agriculture products (white maize) while farmers produce yellow maize, community conflicts leading to destruction of crops and infrastructure, limited diversification of activities, limited capacity of the milling plants for commercial viability, through to power struggles within the Cooperatives who are the intended beneficiaries of the programme. It has since been concluded that the governance model of the RED hubs as businesses as they are not yielding the desired results and outcomes, hence this request for specialist business consultants.

As part of the sector development, the RED hubs are viewed as a necessity for the local and regional value chain development and therefore need to be revisited by exploring alternative models that could turnaround these hubs into profitable and sustainable businesses operating in the rural areas of the province. It is therefore critical that these be viewed as rural industrial platforms aimed at providing for value addition, processing, warehousing, and distribution of products within a specific locality or region. In managing the platforms; considerations regarding the pillars of any industrial property which includes the ownership, governance, operationalisation and viability must be made thus providing foundation for sustainability. This is viewed as critical because of various stakeholders and role players with varying expectations from the platforms. A detailed review of the existing RED hubs is therefore sought in order to inform the redesign for a better-informed programme going forward with the RED Hubs. The need for the hubs cannot be ignored as they provide an opportunity for the development of local economy and creating a pathway for the alignment of the most rural based industrial platforms with other industrial platforms along the industrial infrastructure continuum in the province, thus ensuring inclusive economic growth and development.

The ECDC is therefore seeking to appoint competent and experienced business consultants to conduct a detailed review on the identified RED hubs (Mqanduli, Emalahleni and Mbizana) and redesign into a comprehensive Rural Enterprise Development Hub Business Model that addresses the unique needs and challenges of the rural areas the Eastern Cape Province. The revised model should be able to attract private sector partners that will invest and operate on the RED Hubs. This model will serve as a roadmap for the sustainable development of rural based agro-processing activities in line with agro industry development in the Eastern Cape.

1.3. Scope of Services Required /Goods required.

The ECDC is looking for an experienced specialist business consultant service provider for the review of three (3) RED hubs for the redesign and modelling of the platforms for local and regional agro industry development.

The professional service provider is expected to perform the following tasks:

- b. To assess appetite of the private sector partners to invest and operate the RED Hub.

- b) Proposed key staff members must participate actively and be able to perform services in accordance with the SLA and the project implementation plan.
- c) The project manager may not change without consultation with and concurrence of the client.
- d) Payments for services rendered will be linked to achievement of detailed milestones as per the approved workplan.
- e) Out-of-pocket disbursements shall be paid in line with the approved fixed disbursements plan. The stipulated minimum 3 workshops shall be face-to-face. Other engagements may be held virtually or face-to-face as agreed by the parties subject to approved disbursements budget.

1.9 The organ of state reserves the right to require of a tenderer, either before a tender is adjudicated or at any time subsequently, to substantiate any claim in regard to preferences, in any manner required by the organ of state.

2 DEFINITIONS

- (a) “**tender**” means a written offer in the form determined by an organ of state in response to an invitation to provide goods or services through price quotations, competitive tendering process or any other method envisaged in legislation;
- (b) “**price**” means an amount of money tendered for goods or services, and includes all applicable taxes less all unconditional discounts;
- (c) “**rand value**” means the total estimated value of a contract in Rand, calculated at the time of bid invitation, and includes all applicable taxes;
- (d) “**tender for income-generating contracts**” means a written offer in the form determined by an organ of state in response to an invitation for the origination of income-generating contracts through any method envisaged in legislation that will result in a legal agreement between the organ of state and a third party that produces revenue for the organ of state, and includes, but is not limited to, leasing and disposal of assets and concession contracts, excluding direct sales and disposal of assets through public auctions; and
- (e) “**the Act**” means the Preferential Procurement Policy Framework Act, 2000 (Act No. 5 of 2000).

3 FORMULAE FOR PROCUREMENT OF GOODS AND SERVICES

3.1. POINTS AWARDED FOR PRICE

3.1.1 THE 80/20 OR 90/10 PREFERENCE POINT SYSTEMS

A maximum of 80 or 90 points is allocated for price on the following basis:

Where

Ps = Points scored for price of tender under consideration

Pt = Price of tender under consideration

Pmin = Price of lowest acceptable tender

3.2. FORMULAE FOR DISPOSAL OR LEASING OF STATE ASSETS AND INCOME GENERATING PROCUREMENT

3.2.1. POINTS AWARDED FOR PRICE

A maximum of 80 or 90 points is allocated for price on the following basis:

$$\begin{array}{ccc} \mathbf{80/20} & \mathbf{or} & \mathbf{90/10} \\ \\ Ps = 80 \left(1 + \frac{Pt - P_{max}}{P_{max}} \right) & \mathbf{or} & Ps = 90 \left(1 + \frac{Pt - P_{max}}{P_{max}} \right) \end{array}$$

Where

- Ps = Points scored for price of tender under consideration
 Pt = Price of tender under consideration
 Pmax = Price of highest acceptable tender

4. POINTS AWARDED FOR SPECIFIC GOALS

4.1. In terms of Regulation 4(2); 5(2); 6(2) and 7(2) of the Preferential Procurement Regulations, preference points must be awarded for specific goals stated in the tender. For the purposes of this tender the tenderer will be allocated points based on the goals stated in table 1 below as may be supported by proof/ documentation stated in the conditions of this tender:

4.2. In cases where organs of state intend to use Regulation 3(2) of the Regulations, which states that, if it is unclear whether the 80/20 or 90/10 preference point system applies, an organ of state must, in the tender documents, stipulate in the case of—

- (c) an invitation for tender for income-generating contracts, that either the 80/20 or 90/10 preference point system will apply and that the highest acceptable tender will be used to determine the applicable preference point system; or
- (d) any other invitation for tender, that either the 80/20 or 90/10 preference point system will apply and that the lowest acceptable tender will be used to determine the applicable preference point system,

then the organ of state must indicate the points allocated for specific goals for both the 90/10 and 80/20 preference point system.

 - (c) cancel the contract and claim any damages which it has suffered as a result of having to make less favourable arrangements due to such cancellation;
 - (d) recommend that the tenderer or contractor, its shareholders and directors, or only the shareholders and directors who acted on a fraudulent basis, be restricted from obtaining business from any organ of state for a period not exceeding 10 years, after the *audi alteram partem* (hear the other side) rule has been applied; and
 - (e) forward the matter for criminal prosecution, if deemed necessary.
